Bob is a collector of diving equipment which he had on display in the upstairs conference room at the pier. In 2010 the registered charity, the Historical Diving Society, purchased No 2 Battery at Gosport for the purpose of developing the site as a diving museum. Due to reorganization of the buildings on the pier Bob's display had to be moved. He generously offered items to the HDS. On 30th April 2011 The Diving Museum opened with many of Bob's items being placed on display. Some of his equipment can also still be seen in the Pier Museum located behind the shop.

On our arrival Bob was greeted by Dr John Bevan the founding Chairman of the HDS who took Bob away for a special viewing of their archives. Meanwhile the rest of us enjoyed viewing and reading the history of the equipment.

To Chris's great surprise (not ours) he found a more up to date model of his US Divers Conshelf 12 on display. I believe he has now offered them a swop.



In 1990 Dr John Bevan obtained his Doctorate in the development of diving equipment. In 1970 he obtained his MSc in the neurophysiology of deep diving. He was his own guinea pig when in 1970 he achieved a then record breaking dive to 1500 feet on Heliox with 1% Oxygen – and he never even got wet. It took him 2 weeks to decompress.
